## Keeping it Legal

The U3A has begun its national workshop series with 'Keeping It Legal' at the Met Hotel in Leeds.

This is a new series of training events run by the Third Age Trust, aimed for U3A committee members, covering the General Data Protection Regulation, Insurance, Safeguarding, and Equality, Diversity and Inclusion.

Due to a high level of interest in the two pilot workshop days - both of which are now full - a third is being organised. The date and venue are yet to be confirmed and communication will take place regarding this event as soon as the details are finalised. ## Advice from U3APlus

*Hilary Jones, Trustee for Wales and Chairman of U3APlus has some advice for any U3A planning an event.*

Before planning an event or booking a venue here is a check list to make sure that it is accessible to all our members regardless of impairment or disability.

1. Is it accessible by wheelchair? What exit arrangements are in place in case of emergency evacuation?
2. Are there disabled toilets?
3. Is there a working hearing loop, that you know how to use?
4. Is there good lighting in the rooms being used?
5. Is there parking near the entrance for those with limited mobility?

Thank you – because taking time to have this checklist will help make your event accessible to ALL your members.

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## Other news

### **Cryptic crossword technology**

National Subject Adviser on Cryptic Crosswords, Henry Howarth (Bournemouth U3A), has helped software company Teazel develop an interactive app for teaching how to solve cryptic crosswords. Teazel approached Henry after reading his book

'Learn How to Solve Cryptic Crosswords: A Course for Beginners' and were keen to use the learning content from the book.

Henry said: "I was very excited by the opportunity to work on this project because of the potential an app has to provide an interactive learning experience. All of the practical work – basic skills, practice clues and practice puzzles – can be done on screen, and the learner can track their progress through the course." The first version of the app Learn Cryptic Crosswords is now available for iPhone and iPad from the Apple App Store. An Android version for phones and tablets is also being developed.

### **Kelvin, Wooler U3A**

*Kelvin is one of the Trust's volunteers*

After my wife died of a brain tumour, I began the next phase of my life in Seahouses, on the glorious North Northumberland coast. Around six years ago, I discovered U3A in Berwick-upon-Tweed and, a few years later, I realised Wooler U3A existed in the foothills of the Cheviots. I joined their new group, 'Enquiring Minds', and had a great time.

I trained as a middle school teacher but, aged thirty, I began my "life's work" as an Assistant Director of the national mental health charity Mind, responsible for North East England and Cumbria. From the age of thirteen, alongside my paid employment and into retirement, I have been a volunteer.

For me, adjusting to living alone in a new area had many challenges. There is no doubt that U3A provides a wonderful, welcoming social network: kindred spirits and friends galore!

Being recruited as a U3A volunteer by regional trustee Elizabeth Porter has been a delightful extension of my U3A involvement. Learning new skills, meeting new people, discovering other U3As ... all very positive.
